Proclamation.

DAY OF THANKSGIVING

AVING received from THE PRESIDENT of the UNITED STATES, the following PROCLAMATION, viz. " WHEREAS it is the Duty of all Nations, to acknowledge the Providence of Almighty GOD, to obey his Will, to be grateful for his Benefits, and humbly to implore his Protection and Favour: And whereas both Houses of Congress, have, by their joint Committee, requested me to recommend to the People of the United States, a Day of Public Thanksgiving and Prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful Hearts, the many and fignal Favours of Almighty GOD, especially by affording them an Opportunity peaceably to establish a Form of Government, for their Safety and Happinels. Now THEREFORE I DO recommend and affign THURSDAY, the TWENTY-SIXTH day of NOVEMBER next, to be devoted by the People of these States, to the service of that great and glorious BEING, who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be: That we may then all unite in rendering unto him our fincere and humble Thanksfor his kind care and protection of the People of this Country, previous to their becoming a Nation ,-for the fignal and manifold Mercies, and the favourable interpofitions of his Providence in the course and conclusion of the late War; for the great degree of Tranquility, Union and Plenty, which we have fince enjoyed; for the peaceable and rational Manner in which we have been enabled to establish Constitutions of Government for our Safety and Happinels, and particularly the National one now lately inflituted ;-for the civil and religious Liberty, with which we are bleffed, and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful Knowledge ;-and in general, for all the great and various Favours, which he hath been pleased to confer upon us. AND ALSO, That we may then unite in most humbly offering our Prayers and Supplications to the GREAT LORD and RULER of Nations, and befeech him to pardon our National and other Transgressions ;-to enable us all, whether in public or private Stations, to perform our several and relative Duties properly and pun builty ;-to render our National Government a Eleffing to all the People, by constantly being a Government of wife, just and conflitutional Law a differently and faithfully executed and obeyed 3-to protect and guide all Sovereigns and Nations, (efpecially such as have thewn Kindness unto us) and to blef, them with good Government, Peace and Concord 3-to promote the Knowledge and Practice of true Religion and Virtue, and the enercede of Science among them and us :- and generally to grant unto all Mankind such a degree of temporal Prosperity, as he alone knows to be best. The second region of the first best blood day of the sea he specified of our Ancestors, and continued from the section of this Country, to set a part a Day in the Year,

for public and field THANKSGIVING and PRAISE:

I DO THEREFORE, by and with the Advice of the Council, appoint THURSDAY, the TWENTYstarts Day of November aforefald, to be religiously observed as a Day of THANKSGIVING and PRAISE, within this Commonwealth: Calling upon Miniffers and People to affemble on the fame Day, and join with the other States in the Union, in rendering Thanks to Almichty GOD, for the great Bleffings befrowed upon these considerated States. And to acknowledge his manifold goodness to the People of this Commonwealth ;-in particular, in that he has been pleafed to favour us with fo good a measure of Health, the Year past 3-to prosper in so great a degree our Hufbandry, our Eithery, Trede and Manufactures; but more efficially that we still enjoy that most invaluable Blesling, the Gospel of Peaceat the fame Time accompanying their Thankfgiving with humble Supplication, that we may ever live mindful of our Obligations to our Divine Benefactor; that his Favours may still be continued to us, and that the Christian Religion in its true Spirit, may prevail amongst us, and be extended to all People upon the Earth.
