The sollowing Extracts from the Votes paneles, coffee or pimento, from the British plantation and Proceedings of the American Continental Congress, we are induced to publish thus early purely to case the Impatience of the Public.

## ASSOCIATION, &c.

WE his Majesty's most loyal subjects, the Delegates of the several Calaria Calaria shire, Massachussetts-Bay, Rhode-Island, Connecticut, New-York, New-Jersey, Pennsylvania, the Three Lower Counties of New-Castle, Kent, and Sussex, on Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North-Carolina, and South-Carolina, deputed to represent them in a continental Congress, held in the city of Philadelphia, on the fifth day of September, 1774, avowing our allegiance to his Majesty, our affection and regard for our fellow-febjects in Great Britain and eliewhere, affected with the deepest anxiety, and most alarming apprehensions at those Grievances and distresses, with which his Majesty's American subjects are oppressed, and having taken under our most ferious deliberation, the state of the whole continent, find, that the present unhappy lituation of our affairs, is occasioned by a ruinous system of colony admi-jour fellow-subjects in Great-Britain, Ireland or wife nistration adopted by the British Ministry about the year 1763, evidently calculated for enflaving these Colonies, and, with them, the British Empire. In profecution of which system, various Acts of Parliament have been passed for raising a Revenue in America, for depriving the American subjects, in many instances, of the constitutional trial by jury, eastering their lives to danger, by directing o new and illegal trial beyond the seas, for crimes alledged to have been committed in America: And in profecution of the same system, several late, cruel and oppressive Acts have been passed respecting the town of Boston and the Massachusetts-Bay, and also an Act for extending the province of Quebec, so as to border on the weltern frontiers of these Colonies, establishing an arbitrary government therein, and discouraging the settlement of British subjects in that wide extended country; thus by the influstry shall chuse so to direct them.

To obtain redress of these grievances, which threa- Sixtb. and non-exportation agreement, faithfully adhered to, immediate dismission from their service. will prove the most speedy, effectual, and peaceable measure: And therefore we do, for ourselves and present, firmly agree and associate under the sacred lows.

First. That from and ass merchandize whatfoever, or from any other place any rate terms. fuch goods, wares or merchandize, as shall have been exported from Great-Britain or Ireland; nor will we,

ons or from Dominica; nor wines from Medeira, or the Western-Islands: nor foreign Indigo.

Second, THAT we will neither import, nor purchase any flave imported after the first day of December nextu-after which time, we will wholly discontinue the flaye-trade, and will neither be concerned in it ourfelds, nor will we hire our vessels, nor sell our commodities or manufactures to those who are concerned in it.

Third. As a non-confumption agreement, itrictly adhered to; will be an effectual security for the observation of the non-importation, we as above, folemnly agree and affociate, that from this day, we will not purchase or use any Tea imported on account of the East-India company, or any on which a duty hath been or shall be paid, & from & after the 1st day of March next, we will not purchase or use any East-India Tea whatever, nor will we, nor shall any person for or under us, purchase or use any of those goods, wares or mershandize, we have agreed not to import, which we shall know, or have cause to suspect, were imported after the first day of December, except such as come under the rules and directions of the tenth article herelafter mentioned.

Fourth. THE earnest desire we have, not to inquie West-Indies, induces us to suspend a non-exposition until the tenth day o. September 1775; at which title, if the aid Acts and parts of Acts of the British parliament havin after mentioned, are not repealed, we will not, directly having freezly, export any merchandile or commodity whatfirver, to Great-Billing, Treland, or the Welt-Indies, except there to Butter and
