

NEWS AND NOTES.

On the subject of slavery, the rabbi declared that the slaves of the heathen nations considered Palestine a paradise, and thither they fled. "Thou shalt not deliver unto his master the servant which is escaped from his master unto thee; he shall dwell with thee, among you in that place which he shall choose in one of thy gates where it liketh him best; thou shalt not oppress him." That was close on abolitionism, the rabbi suggested. So, too, the giving of rest to the slaves, male and female, on the seventh day, was it not granting them equality before the law? Turning to the charge that the Bible teaches polygamy, the rabbi dwelt at length on the grandeur, beauty and chasteness of the Song of Songs as expressive of the love of one man for one woman, and the sublimity of the last chapter of Proverbs wherein the good housewife is praised to the skies, and asked if a nation advocating a degrading and immoral life could have produced such literature. And the prohibition was held out in the Oriental king, of almost omnipotence: "Your king shall beware of taking to him many wives."
