## H A P. VIII.

An ACT to provide for the Covernment of the territory North-West of the River OHIO.

Recital.

THEREAS in order that the ordinance of the United States in Congress assembled, for the Government of the territory north-west of the river Ohio may continue to have full effect, it is requifite that certain provisions should be made, so as to adapt the fame to the present Constitution of the United States:

Covernor to make all communications United States.

SEC. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress affembled, That in all cases in which by the faid ordinance, any information is to be given, or communication made by the Governor of the faid territory to the hereafter to the United States in Congress assembled, or to any of their officers, it President of the shall be the duty of the said Governor to give such information and to make such communication to the President of the United States: and the President shall nominate, and by and with the advice and confent of the Senate, shall appoint all officers which by the said ordinance were to have been appointed by the United States in Congress assembled, and all officers so appointed, shall be commissioned by him; and in all cases where the United States in Congress assembled, might, by the faid ordinance, revoke any commission or remove from any office, the President is hereby declared to have the fame powers of revocation and removal.

## C H A P. IX.

An ACT for the establishment and support of LIGHT-Houses, Beacons, Buoys, and Public Piers.
