The Order for Morning Prayer.

These Sentences, *O Lord, correct me, &c.*

I will arise and go to my Father, &c.

THE Sacrifice of God is a troubled
Spirit: a broken and contrite Heart,
O God, thou wilt not despise.

O Lord God of our Salvation, in whose Hands are all the Issues of
Life

Life and Death, of Good and Evil, and without whose Aid, the wisest Counsels of frail Men, and the Multitude of an Host, and all the Instruments of War are but weak and vain; incline thine Ear, we pray thee, to the earnest and devout Supplications of thy Servants, who, not confiding in the Splendour of any thing that is great, or the Stability of any thing that is strong here below, do most humbly flee, O Lord, unto thee for Succour, and put their Trust under the Shadow of thy Wings. Be thou to us a Tower of Defence against the Assaults of our Enemies, our Shield and Buckler in the Day of Battle, and so bless the Arms of our gracious Sovereign in the Maintenance of his just and lawful Rights, and the Advancement of the Welfare of his Kingdoms; that we being preserved by thy Help and Goodness from all Perils and Distasters, and made happily triumphant over all the Disturbers of our Peace, may joyfully laud and magnify thy glorious Name, and serve thee from Generation to Generation in all Godliness and Quietness, through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

We confess with Sorrow and Confusion, our long Unfruitfulness under the Means of Grace, the Light of thy Gospel, and the many wonderful Deliverances of this Church and State, which thou in thy great Goodness has vouchsafed unto us. O Lord, shouldest thou enter into Judgment with us for the crying Sins of this Nation, our Profaneness and Infidelity, Heresies and Schisms, our gross Impurities, and other manifold Offences, thou mightest justly inflict upon us the Severity of thy Wrath, and deliver us

up to the Reproaches and Insults of our Enemies ; but there is Mercy with thee, therefore shalt thou be feared. Thou art the Lord God, tender and full of Compassion, not willing that any should perish, but that all should repent and live : Look down therefore, we beseech thee, with an Eye of Pity and Lovingkindness upon thy Servants, who with broken and contrite Hearts do here bewail our Transgression and Wretchedness. Let our Land, in this Time of Trouble, still enjoy the Light of thy Countenance, and the Blessings of thy bountiful Hand ; and so work upon our Hearts and Minds by the gracious Influences of thy Holy Spirit, that being turned from the Error of our Ways, and created to Newness of Life, we may walk before thee in all Righteousness and Holiness in this World, and inherit thine everlasting Kingdom in that which is to come, through the Merits of Jesus Christ our only Mediator and Advocate. *Amen.*

Take away from us, O Lord, all Hardness of Heart, all Neglect of thine Ordinances, and Contempt of thy Word, and endue us with a Spirit of Piety and Devotion, a Spirit of Justice and Temperance, of Humility and Charity, and of all other Graces which adorn the Christian Profession, that so thy dreadful Displeasure and Judgments may be ever averted from us, and Iniquity not become our Ruin. Be thou pleased also with thine especial Favour to guard and prosper our gracious Sovereign King GEORGE, with all the Royal Family. Be thou to him, O Lord, an Helmet of Salvation against his Enemies that delight in War. Do thou, we pray thee, blast their wicked Designs, defeat their Stratagems, and so put them to Flight
