

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

By the Packet ship James Cropper, which arrived at New-York last week from Liverpool, English papers to the 22d January have been received.

From the London Courier of January 20. Although the statement is premature, as to any official notification having been made to our Government, of the recognition of South America by the Netherlands, there is, we believe, little reason to doubt that such a measure will actually be adopted.
