A PROCLAMATION For a Public Thanksgiving.

LTHO' Almighty GOD hath in his Wisdom with-held from us the Blessings of Peace; yet he is graciously pleased still to favour our Cause, and to lay good Foundations for that happy Event, by humbling the Pride of our Enemies and defeating, their Endeavours to rob us of the Fruits of our Victories. We have feen these his Mercies extended to us, not only by turning the Hearts of Princes and Sates heretofore inimical to us, but by an uncommon Series of Successes of his Majesty's Arms:

Among these we cannot forget the important Conquest of Martinico, which, tho' not a late Event, hath not yet been included in our Religious Thanklgivings; We must with Thankfulness reslect upon the slourishing State of our Affairs in Germany, and particularly the late Repulse of the French Forces by Prince Ferdinand, which reflects so great Honor on the Arms of Great-Britain. But above all, with Hearts full of Gratitude and Amazement, we must contemplate the glorious and important Conquest of the HAVANNAH; which, considering the Strength of the Place, the Resolution of the Defendants, and the Unhealthiness of the Climate, seems to have the visible Hand of GOD in it; and to be defigned by his Providence, to punish the Pride and Injustice of that Prince, who has is unnecessarily made himself a Party in this War.

WHEREFORE, I have thought fit to appoint, and by and with the Advice of his Majesty's Council, and at the Request of the House of Representatives, I do appoint Thursday the Seventh Day of October, to be a Day of Public Thanksgiving, to return Thanks to Almighty GOD, for these and all other his manifold Mercies; and humbly to implore his further Favour, that He would be graciously pleased, at his own Time, and by his own Means, to conduct us fafely to an honourable and permanent Peace.

AND I do order the faid Day to be Merved as a Day fet apart for Religious Worship, and that no servile Labour be permitted on the same.
