Arrangements for the Celebration of Independence.

An Oration, by A. G. WHITNEY, Esq.

The Declaration of Independence to be read by CHARLES LARNED, Esq.

Capt. GLEASON appointed Marshal of the day, and Lieut. MACKAY as't Marshal

A procession will be formed in front of Major WHIPPLE'S Hotel, precisely at 11 o'clock, a. m. in the following order:

- 1.—Military Escort.
- 2.—President and Vice Presidents of the day.
- 3.—Orator and Clergy.
- 4.—Officers of the Army and Navy.
- 5.—Civil Officers of the U. S. over this Territory.
- 6.—Corporation of the city of Detroit.
- 7.—Instructors and Youth of Detroit.
- 8.—Members of the Lyceum of the city of Detroit.
- 9.—Any other societies, in the same order.
- 10.—Subscribers to the Dinner.
- 11.—Any other Citizens, and Strangers disposed to accompany the procession.

THE route of the procession to be up Jefferson Avenue, thence down Bates street, thence up Woodbridge street, thence up Randolph street, thence down Jefferson Avenue to the Council-House: and to return down Jefferson Avenue until it intersects Bates street, then down Bates street until it intersects Woodbridge street, then down said street until it intersects Woodward Avenue, then up said avenue until it intersects Jefferson Avenue, and thence to the place of entertainment.

THE usual display of Colors will be regulated by the several Commanders; and national salutes and other firings, as directed by the Major General commanding.

A Cannon will be fired precisely at 11 o'clock, a. m. as the signal to assemble.

THE Committee recommend it to the citizens to suspend all business from 11, a. m. and to attend the procession.
