

## AProclamation for a generall Fast throughout this Realme of England.

He fresh memory of the late fearefull visitation of the Plague, as in many other places and parts of this Realme, so especially in and about the Cities of London and Westminster, and places adiacent, and the spreading thereof in many parts of this Kingdome at this time, ought to move be to consider, that it was, and is the immediate hand of God sor the sumes of this Land, so to visite and correct his people; And agame, the contemplation of the infinite goods

stepf God, so buexpectedly to heale this great and populous Citie (the seate of this Empire) ought to draw be to a due and thankefull acknowledgement of so great a deliverance: The remembrance of the scarcitic and famine lately threatned buto be mall the borders of this Land, ought to humble bs. And the bleffing of God bpon the fruits of the earth in the time of our greatest distresse, ought to sirre by our thankefulnesse buto that divine Paielly, who was the giner of thele bleffings: The prefent effate of his Maiesties Dominions, and of his friends and Allies imbarked in a warre, with a potent and vigilant enemy, fetting Us in an open Holiditie abroad, and threatning be with a powerfull invalion at home, ought to perswade be, not onely to a timely preparation for all things necessary for a defensive warre, but also to looke by to him, whole providence governes, and whole power ruleth all things byon earth: And our former deliverances in like diffrestes, ought to raile our thoughts, not to neglect the ordinary meanes, and yet to trust in him onely who is the Lord of hostes, and who alone can deliner in times of danger: These Pious and Religious confiderations have so wrought in the Princely heart of the Kings most excellent Paicitie. That he hath not onely had recourse to that great and Dis uine Pateltie, who is the King of kings, in his private devotions, to implose his mercie and fauour to himicife and his people; But according to the crample of all good Kings in former ages in the times of common calamities, which equally concerne both Prince and people, to command a folemne, a generall, and a publike Fast throughout all this whole Land, wherein the whole Ringdome (as one man) may prefent to God their hearty and bulained thankes for His benefits already received, and may power out their supplications with Arong cryes buto Him, to send a bleffing bean our endeavours, and to divert those punishments from bs, which the sinnes of this Land have worthily deferued.

To this purpole, his most excellent Paielite, imoued therunto, the rather by the good inclination of the Commons house of Parliament, lately affembled, who being the representative Body of this Realme, and bell knowing the necessities of them all, did intimate their delire thereof) hath confulted with his reverend Bithops, and refolved byon a grave and religious forme of folemnizing thereof, which his Royall Pleature he doth hereby publich and declare to all his louing Subjects, And doth firaitly charge and command, That on wednelday next, being thefile day of July, this Fall be religiously and folemnly observed and celebrated in the Cities of London and Wellminster, and places adiacent, wherein his Paiestie in his Royall Person, and with his owne family and Royall houthold, will give an example to the reftof his people. And that on that day moneth, being the fecond of August, the like be kept and duly observed, thosowout the rest of this whole Realme of England and Dominion of Wales. And for the more orderly folemnizing thereof without confusion, his Paieltie, by the adulte of his Reverend Bishops, hath directed to be Compoled, Printed, and Published, the forme of such Prayers and publike Exportations, as he thinketh fit to be bled in all Churches and places at thelepublike meetings. And hee hath ginen charge to his Bilhops to disperse the same thosowout his whole Kingdome. All which, his Patelic doth expedy charge and command, thall be reverently and devoutly performed by all his loning Subjects, as they tender the favour of Almighty God, and would avoid his will indignation against this Land, and byon paine of such punishments, as his Paiestie can intity inflict byon all luch, as thall contemne, or neglect fo religious a worke.
