## PROCLAMATION

Appointing the General Fast, which according to former Order falleth out to be on Wednesday the First of November, being All Saints day, to be kept on the Wednesday following, being the Eighth of that Moneth.

Nexus Mereas the Kings most Excellent Pajesty did by His Royal Pzorlamation, bearing Date the Sixth day of July last, appoint that from the time therein mentioned, the First Wednesday of every Aboneth successibely should be observed and kept in all parts of this Realm, as a day of falting and Dumiliation, until it shall please God to withdzaw this Plague and griebous Sickness. And to the end that Prayers and Shipplication may every where veoffered up unto Almighty. God for the Remobal of this beaby Judgment: And whiteas the First Coedhelday in November

mhich according to that Dider ought to be kept) falls out to be. All-Saints day, which is a great Festival in the Thurch, and so not fit to be kept as a day of Fasting and Humiliation. His Abafesties pleasure is, and the both hereby Declare, Ahat the Dert Cliednesday following in the said Moneth, that is to say, Alednesday the eighth of November, shall be kept in all parts of this Realm as a day of Falting and Humiliation, inclead of the First Alednesday of that Moneth. And foz the time to come, the First Wednesday in every Moneth shall be so kept as was appointed by the said former Proclamation; Except the same falls out to be on some day appointed to be kept Holy, and in that case it shall be kept the Clednesday following, as is hereby directed. And His Majelty doth hereby again call upon the Respective Pzeachers on the said Fast-days, that they do Carnestly Exhort the People, in the seberal Churches, to a Free and Thearful Contribution, towards the Relief of their Chzistian Bzethzen, whom it hath pleased Bod to visit with Sickness; And that the Moneys so gathered be disposed according as Wis Majelty hath directed by Wis said Former Proclamation.

Given at the Court at Oxford the Twenty Sixth day of September, in the Seventeenth

year of his Majesties Reign. 1665.
