A PROCLAMATION For a General Fast.

CHARLES R.



Thereas the Loods Sparitual and Temporal, and Commons in Parliament Assembled, having bein made acquainted by His Pajetty, That there is Information given of an Sporible Design against His Sacred Life; And being very fensible of the fatal Consequence of such an Attempt, and of the dangers of the Subversion of the Pietestant Resignon, and Government of this Realm (which God in his infinite Piercy hath hitherto hydreneed, and it is to be hoped will prevent for the future) have most humbly belought his Pajesty, That a Solemn Day of Fasting and Humiliation may be appointed, to Impose the Mercy and Protection of Amignity God to his Majestics Koval Person, and it

ploje the Percy and Potention of Almighty God to his Pajelties Royal Perlon, and in him to all his Loyal Subjects; and to pray that God will bring to light more and more all fectet Pachinations against his Pajelty and the whole Kingdom: The Kings most Excellent Pajelty, out of his own Religious Disposition, hath readily inclined thereunto; And doth therefore by this his Royal Proclamation, Command a General and Publick Fast to be kept throughout this whole Kingdom, in such manner as is hereafter Directed and Prescribed, that so both Prince and People may send up their Prayers and Supplications to Almighty God, to and for the purposes aforesaid. And to the end that so Religious an Exercise may be performed at one and the same time, his Pajesty doth hereby Publish and Declare to all his Loving Subjects, and doth straitly Charge and Command, That on Wednesday being the Thirteenth day of November next, this Fast shall be Religiously kept and celebrated throughout his Kingdom of England, Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed. And that the same may be performed with all Decency and Uniformity, his Pajesty, by the Advice of his Reverend Bishops, hath Directed to be Composed, Printed and Published, such a form of Divine Service as he chinketh sit to be used in all Churches and Places at the time aforesaid, and hath given Charge to his Bishops to Disperse the same accordingly. All which his Wajesty doth expeedy Charge and Command shall be Reverently and Decentry observed by all his Loving Subjects, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and hould avoid his Arath and Indignation against this Land, and upon pain of undergoing such Punishments as his Pajesty may justly institution as shall contenn of neglect so Religious a Duty.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall, the Twenty fifth day of October, 1678. in the Thirtieth year of Our Reign.
