Answ. Because there is none other that fighteth sozus, but only thou, D God. Rriest. D God, make clean our hearts within us, Answ. And take not thy Poly Spirit from us.

Instead of the first Collect for the Day, the following Prayer shall be used.

The praise thy Name for thy mereiful providence; and we beseech thee to arant. that out of a due sense of this great and wonderful instance of it, we may live as becomes a people faved by the hand. Banish, we may thee, from among us, all immorality and profanenels, purge us krom all our abominations, take away all hatred and distensions, and endue us with a spirit of true viety and holinels, of love and charity. of unity and concord: That the blessings of Peace. together with the Purity of religion, unshaken by Insidelity, and uncozzupted by Superstition, may be fecured to us, and continued to our posserity, ter the merits of thy only Son our Saviour Christ Teller. Amen.

Morning Prayer.

- Then shall follow the fecond and third Collects at Morning Prayer: And the Litany.
- In the End of the Litany after the Collect [We humbly befeech thee, &c] shall be said this Prayer following:

Most great and mighty Lord, who art glorious in holinels, fearful in praises, doing wonders? We most humbly present ourselves at the throne of thy grace to bless and adore thy unsveakable goodners for all thy late mercies bouch= safed unto us: Thou hast thewn us wonderful things in thy righteousness. D God of our salva= tion. To thee alone we ascribe the glozy of all our deliverances; for it is thou who hast wrought all our works for us. Therefore not unto us. D Lozd, not unto us, but unto thy Dame be the waise, for thy loving mercy and for thy truth's take. Let this, we beseech thee, be the blessed fruit of thy marvellous loving kindnels towards us, that we may turn every one from the evil of his wap, and live as a people that have been so often the visible care of thy providence. Let the sacred Person of our gracious Sovereign King GEORGE be always precious in thy light. Let Dis Reign be prosperous, and His Days many: Guard Him from all Dangers here, and bzing Him to thy Glory hereafter; so shall we give thee thanks in the assemblies of thp Saints, and be daily thewing forth thy praise from generation to generation, through Jesus Christ our unly Wediator and Advocate. Amen.

And we beseech thee, give us that due sense of all thy mercies, that our hearts may be unfeignedly thankful; and that we may thew forth thy maise, not only with our lips, but in our lives, by

In the Communion Service, at the End of the Commandments, after the Collect for the King [Almighty God, whose Kingdom is everlasting &c.] instead of the Collect for the Day, shall be used the following Collect.

Eternal God, the ever blessed and only Potentate, the Prince of Peace; accept, we beseech thee, the thanklgivings and mailes of thy Servants, for our deliverance from those great and apparent Dangers wherewith we were encompassed. It is of thy mercy, D Lozd, that we were not ut= terly consumed; that our Religion was not de= Aroped, noz our Liberty subverted, but that we still freelp profess thy Sacred Truth, and joyn in thy most Holy Wolhip, and possels the Rights and Inherit= ences of our fathers. Perfect, Dgracious God, the Work that thou half begun amongst us: Bless and prosper the hands by which thou hast conveped this mercy to us. Direct our Governors with the spirit of wisdom and righteousness. Rule thou in the midst of our publick Councils, for the advancement of thy glozy and the lasting welfare of this great peotile, that they may evermoze be preserved from the Cozuptions of Popery, the Wiseries of Slavery,

and live in the uniform practice of piety and virtue. These Blessings we most humbly implore for the sake of Christ Jesus our Lord. Amen.

The Epistle. Galat. V. Ver. 13.

DR, brethren, pe have been called unto Liberty; only use not Liberty for an occasion to the Flesh, but by love serve one another. For all the law is fulfilled in one word, even in this; Thou Malt love thy neighbour as thyself. But if pe bits and devour one another, take heed that pe be not con= sumed of one another. This I say then, Walk in the Spirit, and pe shall not fulfil the lust of the stelh. For the slesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the slesh: and these are contrary the one to the other; so that ye cannot do the things that pe would. But if pe ve led by the Spirit, pe are not under the law. Pow the works of the slesh are manisest, which are these, Adultery, forni= cation, uncleanness, lasciviousness, idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, seditions, heresies, envyings, murders, dunkenness, revellings, and such like: of the which I tell you before, as I have also told you in time past, that they which do such things, shall not inherit the Kingdom of God. But the kruit of the Spi= rit is love, joy, peace, long-suffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance: against fuch there is no law. And they that are Chill's, have crucified the flesh, with the affections and lusts. If we live in the Spirit, let us also walk in the Spirit. Let us not be desirous of vain glozy, provoking one another, envying one another.

The Gospel. St. Luke VI. Ver. 27, to Ver. 39.

TITT I say mito you which hear, Love your D Enemics, do good to them which hate you: viels them that curse pou, and prap for them which destitefully use you. And unto him that smiteth thee on the one cheek, offer also the other: and him that taketh away thy cloke forbid not to take typ coat also. Give to every man that asketh of thee; and of him that taketh away thy goods ask them not again. And as pe would that men hould do to you, do pe also to them likewise. For if pe love them which love you, what thank have per for kinners also love those that love them. And if pe do good to them which do good to pou, what thank have per for unners also do even the same. And if pe lend to them of whom ve hope to teceive, what thank have pe? for linners allo dend to sinners, to receive as much again. But love re pour Enemies, and do good, and lend, hoping for nothing again: and pour reward Hall be great, and pe hall be the children of the Highest: for he is kind unto the unthankful and to the evil. Be pe therefore merciful, as pour Kather also is merciful. Judge not, and pe shall not be judged: Condemn not, and ye hail not be condemned: Fozgive, and pe chall be kozgiven: Give, and it Mall be given unto pou; good measure, meded down, and haken together, and running over, Mall men give into pour vosom. For with the same measure that pe mete withal, it wall be measured to you again.

Believe in one God, the Father Almighty, Walker of heaven and earth, And of all things visible and

invisible:

And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God, Begotten of his Father before all worlds; God of God, Light of light, Aery God of very God, Begotten, not made, Being of one subsance with the Father, By whom all things were made: This for us men, and for our falvation, came down from heaven, And was incarnate by the Hely Ghost of the Airgin Mary, And was made man, And was crucified also for us under Pontius Pilate. He suffered and was buried, And the third day he rose again according to the scriptures, And alcended into heaven, and sitteth on the right hand of the Father. And he shall come again with glory to judge both the quick and the dead: Ahose kingdom shall have no end.

and I believe in the Poly Shoft, The Low and giver of life, Who proceedeth from the Kather and the Son together is worthipped and glorified, Who spake by the prophets. And I believe one catholick and apostolick church, I acknowledge one baptism for the remission of sins, And I look for the resurrection of the dead, And the life of the world to come. Amen.

Ale intirely desire to bless and praise thy holy Mame, foz that thou hast heard the Cloice of our humble Petitions, and hast in mercy put an end to the Effusion of Blood, and made Peace in our bozders. D grant, that being delivered from the hands of our Enemies abzoad, we map live in Peace and true Chistian Charity with one another at home. For which end, take away, we beseech thee, all prejudice and hatred, bitter envp= ina and strife, and whatever else map hinder us from godly union and concord. Endue us with the wildom from above, which is pure, peaceable, gentle, easy to be intreated, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality, without hypocrisp. Grant this, D most merciful Father, for the sake of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, and our only Saviour and Redeemer. Amen.

A Prayer for all Mankind, especially for the Reformed Churches.

Lord our God, abundant in goodness and I truth, whose mercies are over all thy works; We beseech thee to extend thy compassion and favour to all Gankind, more especially to all Christians,

and in particular to our Brethren of the Reformed Churches, giving them all blessings convenient for them. A Linighty God, who hast promised to hear the petitions of them that ask in thy Son's Pame; The befeech thee inercifully to incline thing ears to us that have made now our prayers and supplications unto thee; and grant that those things which we have faithfully asked according to thy will, may effectually be obtained, to the relief of our necessities, and to the setting forth of thy glory, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Then the Priest (or the Bishop, if he be present) shall let them depart with this Blessing:
