## THANKSGIVING

To be used

In all Churches and Chapels throughout that Part of Great-Britain called England, the Dominion of Wales, and the Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Ibursday the 29th of November Inflant, being the Day appointed by Proclamation for a General THANKSGIVING to GOD;

For youchsafing such signal Successes to His Majesty's Arms, both by Sea and Land, particularly by the Defeat of the French Army in Canada, and the Taking of Quebeck; and for most seasonably granting us at this Time as uncoinmonty plentiful Harvest.

## The Order for Morning-Prayer.

The Service shall be the same with the usual Office for Holy-Days, except where it is otherwise appointed.

The Prayers shall begin with these Sentences.

HE merciful und gracious Lord bath sa done his marvellous Works, that they ought to be had in Kemembrance. O that

That Men would therefore praise the Lord for his inners, and declure the Wonders that he doth for Children of Men

of the People, and praise him in the Seat of the Elders!

Instead of Venite, exultemus, this Hymn shall be used.

Give Thanks unto the Lord, for he is gracious: and his Mercy endureth for ever.

Let them give Thanks, whom the Lord hath redeemed and delivered from the Hand of the Enemy.

For we gat not the Land in Possession through our own Sword: Neither was it our own Arm that helped us.

But thy Right Hand, and thine Arm, and the Light of thy Countenance: Because thou hadst Fa-

your unto us.

I will alway give Thanks unto the Lord: His Fraise shall be ever in my Mouth.

He hath not dealt with us after our Sins. Nor

rewarded us according to our Wickednesses.

Praise the Lord, O my Soul: And forget not all his Benefits.

For the Arms of the ungodly shall be broken:

But the Lord upholdeth the Righteous.

They shall not be confounded in the perilous I ime: And in the Days of Dearth they shall have enough.

He blesseth them so, that they multiply exceedingly, and suffereth not their Cattle to decrease.

The Salvation of the Righteous cometh of the Lord: Who is also their Strength in the Day of Trouble.

A 2 Instead

Instead of the First and Second Collects at Morning Prayer the two following shall be used.

Lord our God, great in Council and mighty in Work, behold us here assembled to return thee our devoutest Thanks for the manifold Blessings, bestowed on us in the Course of this Year. We acknowledge, with grateful Hearts, thy fatherly Goodness, in preserving our native Country from hostile Invasions; in delivering our distant Settlements from dangerous Attacks; in causing our Enemies to fly before us, both by Sea and Land; in breaking down their strong Holds, and laying their senced Cities into ruinous Heaps; in supporting our Allies against superior Force. It is not our own Strength that hath saved us: But thou hast maintained our Right and our Cause. Praised be the Lord daily: Even the God who helpeth us, and. poureth his Benefits upon us. Comfort, we beseech thee, all who have lost Relations or Friends in Defence of the publick Welfare; and all who have suffered in Body or Estate: And complete, O merciful Father, the Deliverance which thou hast begun. Shew yet more fully, that the most High ruleth in the Kingdom of Men; and those that walk in Pride, he is able to abase. Thou hast compassed us with Sea, as a Wall of Defence; thou commandest the Winds and the Water, and they obey thee: Exert thy Power in making them favourable unto us; that thy People may dwell in a peaceable Habitation, and in quiet resting Places. Bring Destructions every where to a perpetual End: And make Wars to cease in all the World. Abolish Wickedness and Error, and establish the Gospel of Peace throughthroughout the Earth: that thy Creatures may be happy, and thy Name glorified, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Things living with Plenteousness, we thank thee that thou hast given us Rain in its Season, and reserved unto us the appointed Weeks of the Harvest; So that our Land hath yielded us a large Increase. Secure to us, we pray thee, what thou hast bestowed upon us: And let not our Corn be Meat for our Enemies; but may they, who have gathered it, eat it, and praise the Lord: Serving thee with Joysulness and Gladness of Heart for the Abundance of all Things; yet not labouring chiefly for the Food which perisheth, but for that which endureth unto everlasting Life, and is given us by our blessed Redeemer Jesus Christ: Who with thee and the Holy Ghost liveth and reigneth, one God World without End. Amen.

In the Litany, which shall be used on this Day, instead of the Prayer [We bumbly beseech thee, &c.] the following shall be said.

Racious Lord, we have Cause to lie down in Shame, and be covered with Confusion; for we have sinned against thee: And the Goodness, which thou hast! shewn us so plenteously, hath not led us to suitable Repentance, nor have we been duly mindful of the Rock of our Strength. It is only of thy Mercies, that we are not already consumed: And we cannot hope to escape, if we go on to treasure up Wrath unto ourselves. Give us, we intreat thee, a deep Sense of our Dependence upon thee, and our Ingratitude to thee: That there may

not be in any of us an evil Heart of Unbelief, Disobedience or Forgetfulness; but that hencesorth for ever we may serve thee with Fear, and rejoice unto thee with Reverence; engaging thy suture Protection by a Conduct worthy of thy past Favours: For which be ascribed to thee, and thy dear Son, and the Spirit of Grace, all Honour and Glory, Thanksgiving and Praise, World without End. Amen.

## The Communion Service.

After the Commandments, instead of the Collect for the King, and the Collect for the Day, the following shall be used.

TE bless thee, O God, who hast given our gracious Sovereign his Heart's Desire, and hast not denied him the Request of his Lins: But crowned his Labours for the publick Welfare with ever-memorable Success. Long may he see the Felicity of thy Chosen, and rejoice in the Gladness of thy People, and give Thanks with thine Inneritance. May no Weapon formed against him prosper: But may the Pleasure of the Lord prosper in his Hand. May the Children of thy Servant continue, and his Seed be established besore thee. And may these Nations, to whom he hath been thy Instrument of dultinguished Mercies, make the due Return for them, by affectionate Loyalty to his Person and Posterity, and by uniform Obedience to all thy Commandments, for the Sake of Jeius Christ our Lord. Amen.

Enlighten those, who are in Darkness and Error; and give them Repentance, to the Acknowledgment of the Truth: That all the Ends of the World may remember themselves, and be turned unto the Lord; and we may all become one Flock, under the great Shepherd and Bishop of our Souls, Jesus Christ, our only Mediator and Advocate. Amen.

D Lessed God, who hast taught us, by the meek and holy Jesus thy Son, to love our Enemies, and pray for them who despitefully use us; Give Grace, we beseech thee, to our Adversaries in the present War, to see and confess

and amend the injurious Behaviour of which they have been guilty, that so they may obtain Pardon from thee: And grant Us, in the mean time, not only Strength and Courage to withstand them, but Charity to forgive and pity them, to bear them unfeigned good Will, and treat them with Mercy and Humanity, for the Sake of the same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
