
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The Order for Morning Prayer.

The Service shall be the same with the usual Office for Holy-Days, except where it is in this Office otherwise appointed.

¶ The Prayers shall begin with these Sentences.



HE merciful and gracious Lord hath so done his marvellous Works, that they ought to be had in Remembrance.

O that Men would therefore praise the Lord for his Goodness and declare the Wonders that he doth for the Children of Men.

¶ Instead of Venite exultemus, this Hymn shall be used:

GIVE Thanks unto the Lord, for he is gracious: and his Mercy endureth for 'ever.

Let them give Thanks, whom the Lord hath redeemed:

and delivered from the Hand of the Enemy.

For we gat not the Land in Possession through our own Sword: neither was it our own Arm that helped us.

But thy right Hand, and thine Arm, and the Light of thy Countenance: because thou hadst a Favour unto us.

I will alway give Thanks unto the Lord: his Praise shall be ever in my Mouth.

Me band not dealt with us after our Sin: nor rewarded us according to our Wiekelness.

Praise the Lord, O ray Soul: and forget not all

his Benefits.

For the Arms of the Ungodly shall be broken: but the

Lord upholdeth the Righteous.

They shall not be confounded in the perilous Time: and in the Days of Dearth they shall have enough.

He blesseih them so, that they multiply exceedingly,

and suffereth not their Cattle to decrease.

The Salvation of the Righteous cometh of the Lord, who is also their Strength in the Day of Trouble.

The Lord shall give Strength unto his People: the Lord shall give his People the Blessing of Peace.

the Holy Ghost.

After the Creed, and the Lord's Prayer, the Suffrages

Shall be as followeth:

Priest. O Lord, shew thy Mercy upon as:

Answ. And grant us thy Salvation.

Priest. O Lord, save the King;

Answ. Who putteth his Trust in Thes.

Priest. Send him Help from thy Holy Place.

Answ. And evermore mightily defend bim.

Priest. Let his Enemies have no Advantage against him.

Answ. Let not the Wicked approach to hurt him.

Priest. Endue thy Ministers with Righteonsness.

Answ. And make thy chosen People joyful.

Priest. O Lord, save thy People. Answ. And bless thine Inheritance.

Priest. Be unto us a strong Tower.

Answ. From the Face of our Enemies.

Priest. Give Peace in our Time, O Lord.

Answ. Because there is none other that fighteth for us, but only thou, O God.

Priest. O God, make clean our Hearts within us.

Answ. And take not thy Holy Spirit from us.

Instead of the first Collect at Morning Prayer, the following shall be used.

LORD our GOD, great in Counsel and mighty in Work, behold us here assembled to return Thee our devoutest Thanks for thy manifold Blessings, bestowed on us in the Course of this Year. We acknowledge with greatful Hearts, thy fatherly Goodness, in preserving our Nation from hostile Invasions; in delivering our Colonies from dangerous Attacks; in causing our Enemies to fly before us, both by Sea and Land; in breaking down their strong Holds, and laying their fenced Cities into runious Heaps; in supporting our Allies against superior Force. It is not our own Strength that hath faved: but thou hast maintained our Right and our Cause. Praised be the Lord daily: even the God who helpeth us, and poureth his Benefits upon us. Comfort, we beseech Thee, all who have lost Relations or Friends in Defence of the publick Welfare; and all who have suffered in Body or Estate: And complete, O merciful Father, the Deliverance which Thou hast begun. Shew yet more fully,

fully, that the most High ruleth in the Kingdom of Men; and those that walk in Pride, he is able to abase. Thou hast compassed our Nation with the Sea, as a Wall of Defence: Thou commandest the Winds and the Water, and they obey Thee: Exert thy Power in making them favourable unto us; that thy People may dwell in a peaceable Habitation, and in quiet resting Places. Bring Destructions every where to a perpetual End. Abolish Wickedness and Error, and establish the Gospel of Peace throughout the Earth, that thy Creatures may be happy, and thy Name glorisied, thro' Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

In the Litany, which shall be used on the Day, instead of the Prayer (We humbly beleech Thee, &c) the following shall be said.

RACIOUS Lord, we have Cause to lie down in Shame, and be covered with Confusion; for we have sinned against Thee: and the Goodness which Thou hast shewn us so plenteously, hath not led us to suitable Repentance, nor have we been duly mindful of the Rock of our Strength. It is only of thy Mercies that we are not already confumed: and we cannot hope to escape, if we go on to treasure up Wrath to ourselves. Give us, we intreat thee, a deep Sense of our Dependance upon thee, and our Ingratitude to thee: that there may not be in any of us an evil Heart of Unbelief, Disobedience, or Forgetfulness. but that hencesorth for ever we may serve thee with Fear, and rejoice unto thee with Reverence; engaging thy future Protection by a Conduct worthy of thy past Favours: for which be ascribed to thee, and thy dear Son, and the Spirit of Grace, all Honour and Glory, Thanksgiving and Praise, World without End. Amen.

The Communion Service.

After the Commandments, instead of the Collect for the King, and the Collect for the Day, the following shall

be used.

E bless thee, O God, who hast given our gracious Sovereign his Heart's Desire, and hast not denied him the Request of his Lips: but crowned his Labours for the publick Welfare with ever-memorable Success. Long may he see the Felicity of thy Chosen, and rejoice in the Gladness of thy People, and give Thanks with thine Inheritance. May no Weapon formed against him prosper: but may the Pleasure of the Lord prosper in his Hand. May the Children of thy Servant continue, and his Seed be established before thee. And may these Nations, to whom the hath been thy Instrument of distinguished Mercies, make Thee a due Return for them, by affectionate Loyalty to his Person and Posterity, and by uniform Obedience to all thy Commandments, for the Sake of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Epistle. Philippians IV. from the 4th to the 8th V. EJOICE in the Lord alway: and again I say,
Rejoice. Let your Moderation be known unto
all Men. The Lord is at Hand. Be careful for nothing:
but in every Thing, by Prayer and Supplication, with
Thanksgiving, let your Requests be made known unto
God. And the Peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your Hearts and Minds through
Lesis Christ Jesus Christ.

The Gospel. St. Luke, XIII. from 1st to 6th Verse. HERE were present at that Season some that told him of the Galileans, whose Blood Pilate had mingled with their Sacrifices. And Jesus answering, said unto them, suppose ye that these Galileans were sunners above all the Galileans, because they suffered such things? I tell you, Nay: but, except ye repent, ye shall all likewife

wise perish. Or those eighteen, upon whom the tower in Siloam fell, and slew them, think ye that they were sinners above all Men that dwelt in Jerusalem? I tell you, Nay: but except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish.

Then shall follow the Nicene Creed: and after that the Sermon.

In the Offertory shall this Sentence be read.

Hatsoever ye would that men should do unto you, even so do unto them: for this is the Law and the Prophets. Matth. vii. 12.

After the Prayer (for the whole State of Christ's Church).
the following shall be used.

A Prayer for the Reformed Churches.

GOD, the Father Mercies, we present our Supplications unto thee, more especially on behalf of our reformed Brethren, whom, blessed be thy Name, thou hast hitherto wonderfully supported. Make them. perfect, strengthen, stablish them: that they may stand fast in the Liberty, wherewith Christ hath made them free, and adorn the Doctrine of God our Saviour in all Things. Preserve the Tranquility of those, who at prefent enjoy it: look down with Compaffion upon fuch as are persecuted for Righteousness sake; and plead thy Cause with the Oppressors of thy People. Enlighten those, who are in Darkness and Error; and give them. Repentance, to the Acknowledgment of the Truth: That all the Ends of the World may remember themselves, and be turned unto the Lord; and we may all become one Flock, under the great Shepherd and Bishop of our Souls, Jesus Christ, our only Mediator and Advocate. Amen.
