APROCLAMATION,

For the observation of the Nine and twentieth day of May instant, as a day of Publick Thanksgiving, according to the late Act of Parliament for that purpose.

perens by the Act made in Our late Parliament, held at Westminster in the Twelfth year of Our Reign, Entituded, An Act for a perpecual Anniversary Thankspring on the Nine and twentieth day of May, reciting, That for as much as Almighs ty God, the Kings of Kings, and fole disposer of all earthly Crowns and Kings domes, had by hisall-straying Providence and Power, miraculously demonstrated in the view of all the Marld his transcendent Mercy, Love, and Graciousnels to wards Us and all Our Loyal Subjects of this Our Kingdom of England, and the Dominions thereunto amered, by Our most wonderful, glorious, peaceable, and joyful Restauration to the adual possession and exercise of Our undoubted Hereditary, Soveraign and Regal Authority over them (after sun-

Der pears toced Extermination into Foreign parts, by the most Arayterous Conspiracies and armed Power of Alurping Arants, and exerciable and persideous Araytocs) and that without the least opposition or essuance of blood, thosow the Anammous, Cordial, Loyal Actes of the Lords and Commons in the said Parliament Assembled, and passionate desires of all other Our Subjects; which unexpected by Gods own not wonderful dispensation) was compleated on the Pine and thentieth day of May last past, being the most memorable Birth-day not onely of As, both as Pan and Prince, but likewise as an agual King, and of this and other Our Kingdoms, all in a great measure new-born and raised from the dead, on this most soyfull day, wherein many thousands of the Nobility, Gentry,

Gentry, Citizens, and other Dur Lieges of this Dur Realm, conducted Us unto Dur Royal Cities of London and Westminster, With all possible expressions of their publick joy, and Loyal affections, in far greater Triumph then any of Dur most Clictozious Pzedecestozs, Kings of England, returned thither from their Foreign Conquelts, and both Dur then boules of Parliament, with all dutiful and joyful de= montrations of their Allegiance publickly received, and coedially congratulated Our most happy Arris val and Juvestiture in Dur Royal Throne at Dur Palace at Whicehall; upon all which considerations, that being the day which the Lord had made, and crowned with so many publick blessings, and signal betweeness, both of Us and Dur people, from all Our late most deployable Confusions, Divisions, Wedars, Devastations and Opperisions: To theredit might be kept in perpetual remembrance in all needs to come, and that the would with all Our Subjects of this Our Realm, and the Dominions thereof, and Our posterities after Us, might Annually telebrate the perpetual memory thereof, by facrificing their unfeigned hearty publick thanks thereon to Almighty God, with one heart and voice in a most devout and Chaftian maner, for all these publick benefits received and conferred on Us on that most joy= ful day; It was therefore by Authority of the same Parliament Enacted. That all and singular Misnifers of Gods Thord and Sacraments, in every Church, Chappel, and other usual place of Divine Service and publick Prayer, Which then were, or then after Hould, be within this Dur Realm of England, and the respective Dominious thereof, and their Successors, should in all succeeding ages annually Celebrate the land Thenty much day of May, by rending their hearty publick Praises and Thanklgibings unto Almighty God, for all the fore-mentioned extraordinary Percies, Bielsings and Deliverances received, and mighty Ans done thereon, and beclare the same to all the people there affembled, and the generations then, and yet to come, that to they might for everyaite the Lord for the fame, whole Pame alone is Excellent, and his Glory above the Earth and heavens.

And it was further Gnaced, That all and every person and persons inhabiting within this Our Lingdom, and the Dominions thereunto belonging, hould upon the same day annually resort with disconnections. ligence and devotion, to some usual Church, Chappel, or place Where such publick Thanklgivings and Praifes to Gods most Divine Pajeity hall be midjed, and there orderly and devoutly abide during the faid publick Thanklywing, Prayers, Preaching, linging of Plalins, and other Service of God

And to the end that all persons might be put in minde of their duty thereon, and be the better pre= pared to discharge the same With that Piety and Depotion as becomes them, It was further Enacted, That every Hinster should give notice to his Parishmers publickly in the Church at Morning Prayer the Lords day next before every such Twenty muthof May, for the due observation of the same day, and should then like while publickly and distinctly read the same Act to the people, as by the same Act may more at large annear. more at lage appear. The being most sensible of the great and wonderful mercies and deliverances bouch safed by Almighty God, mentioned in the said An, and holding Our Self highly obliged, and being most willing that the just tribute of praise and thanksgiving to Our great Soveraign, the King of Heaven and Earth, he returned by As and all Dur People for the fame, according to the intent of the faid An, do fraightly command and enjoyn all Durlowing Subjects, of what degree, quality, or condition source, folerand and chearfully to conform themselves, and give overdence to the said An of Parliament, and to let apart and observe the Pine and twentieth day of this instant May, and so from time to time every some and twentieth day of May in every year, as a day of publick Peacle and Thanksgiving to Almighty God for his said wonderful Perries, Blessings, and Deliverances wouchsafed to Us and Our People, as in the said Ac is mentioned. And to that end the command all Archbishops, Bishops, Parlons, Usars, Pinisters, and all other Ecclesiasical persons in their several Charges, according to their several duties, to take care thereof, and to equie this Dur Proclamation to be yearly read in all Churches and Chappels the Lords day before the said day of publick Peacle and Thanksgiving is to be observed and celebrated as aforesaid. And the strictly command all persons whatsoever, for the better observation of the said day, to abstain from all service works and business on that day, and chearfully and oederly to repair to the publick place of Gods Divine Morally, for the due personnance of the Duties of that day, according to the good intentions of the said Act.

And the declare, That fuch perfous as that be faulty herein, that be efficined by As, contemmers and infringers of Our Laws and Commands, and as prophane perfons, thutting their eyes against fuch evident manifestations of mercy and goodness vouchsated by Almighty God to As and to Our People.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall, the Twentieth day of May, in the Thirteenth year of Our Reign, 1661.
