## A PROCLAMATION

FOR

Setting apart a Day of Solemn and Publick Thanksgiving throughout the whole KINGDOM.

Hereas it hath pleased Almighty God to manifest his own immediate Goodness, Wisdom, and Power, in his late Providence towards Us, and Dur Kingdoms, wherein, beyond all humans Beans and Contribances, as well of Dur Friends for Us, as of Dur Adberfacies against Us, he hath by the interposition of his own Power and Wisdom, after a long and tedious Erile, returned Us home to Dur People, and, after a long, and termingly indicible, Interruption, restored Dur People and Kingdoms to their ancient Rights, Liberties, and Government; and all this brought about, by his most wife and over-ruling Hand, Without any effusion of Blood: But, instead thereof, filling the Hearts of Us, and

Dand, without any effusion of Blood: But, instead thereof, silling the Hearts of Cls, and Our People, as full of mutual Love, Considence, and Joy, as became such a Achitution of King and People, whereby the Percy is not onely advanced, but the hopes of most happy consequences, thereupon, are increased, we cannot upon the due consideration hereof, but with all humility admire and adoze the Percy and

Goodnels of God, in these his lignal manifestations thereof, and we locked, and still look upon them as invitations from heaven to Us, and all Our people, unto most entire Thankfulness to; the same unto Almighty God, and publick and chearful Expressions thereof.

And whereas in the midst of those Dur considerations, both Dur houses of Parliament by their Address of the One and twentieth of May last, have humbly shewed unto Us, That such is the inclimable blessing of Dur Relitation to Dur Royal Throne, which at once hath put a period to the Calamitics of Three Kingdoms, and to all the Horrows and Huffelman of Dur Royal Person and Family, that they cannot but account it as an entrance into the state of Joy and hopeness, which obligeth all Dur Subjects to conder an Everlasting Tribute of Praise and Thanksgiving to Anagury God, for these glorious Percess to his affacted People.

And to the end, some selemn Line may be let apart for the publick performance of this Duty; and that all Dur Subjects in England and Wales. and the Lown of Berwick upon Twede, do equally that in the joys of this Deliberance, may be united in these Devocious which are offered for it. They there are humbly beserved Us, that we would be pleased by Dur Royal disclaimation to set apart some Day, for a publick Thanksgiving throughout all these Dur Dominions. We willing that the just Tribute of Braile and Thanksgiving to Dur Great Soberaign the King of Heaven and Earth be recurred by Us, and all Dur People for these his Deliberances and Percies; and that as his Percy is of Universal concernment to Us and all Dur Subjects, so, to the end, that the publick Returns of Dur Praise to God, for the same, thought cannot equalize, yet it may in some measure answer the amplitude of the Brnest.

We do hereby Publich and Declare, That the Amenty eight day of this inliant June, be let apart and obserabed as a day of Publick Thanksgiving to Almighty God, throughout Dur Kingdom of England, Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick, for this his great Herey; and we do direct and appoint, that this Dur Proclamation be publickly read in all Churches and Chappels, on some Lords day, precedent thereunto, to the end-that motice be taken thereof, and due Thanks and Praise may, upon the said Awenty eighth day of June, be offered up unto Aimighty God by Us and all Dur People, with one heart, and that humble Supplications be poured out before him, for his continual Assistance and Improvement of this and all his Aercies, to the honor of his great Name, and the Safety Peace and Benefit of all Dur Kingdoms and Dominions. We Willing and frictly commanding all Persons within these Dur Dominions, with all Sobjecty, Reverence, and Thanksulness, to separt that Day to this Duty, and to observe the same as becomes so to incomman an occasion.

Given under Our Sign Manual at Our Court at Whitehal, the Fifth day of June, in the Twelfth Year of Our Reign, 1660.
