A PROCLAMATION

Appointing a time of Publick Thanksgiving and Prayer throughout the Kingdom.

3. Jan. 1687.

T having pleafed Almighty God (who in figual manner hath blessed his Pajerry and this Kingdom under his Pajeries Gobernment, with great Prosperity, Peace and Plenty) to give his Pajering of Pajery also apparent hopes and good assurance of having Mue by his Royal Lonfort the Lucen, who (through Gods great Godnels) is now with Child: And frashmuch as Increase of Psuc of the Royal Family is a Publick Blessing, and (under God) a great Security of Peace and Happinels to this Kingdom: his Pajery therefore hath thought at (at the humble request, and by the Advice of his Psiby Council) to Appoint a time, upon this occasion, to render Publick and Hearty Thanks, throughout the Kingdom, for this great Blessing already begun, and to offer up Prayers to Almighty God for the continuance

thereof: And his Dajelly doth accordingly Appoint, Command and Require, That upon the Fifteenth day of January nert, within the Cities of London and Westmister, and Ten Diles electadout, and upon the Kine and twentieth day of the same Ponth, in all other Places throughout this Kingdom, Publick Thanks, and Solumn Prayers be offered up to Alunghy God upon the Occasion aforesaid: And for this purpose his Pajesty hath lignified his Royal Pleasure to the Right Reverend Fathers in Sol Nathaniel Lord Bissop of Duresme, Thomas Lord Bissop of Rochester, and Thomas Lord Bissop of Peterborough (being his Pajesties Commissioners Constituted for Exercising the Instance of Peterborough (being his Pajesties of London) forthwith to prepare a form of Prayer and Religious Service, which may be suitable to this occasion; Which Form of Prayer and Religious Service, which may be suited and Published, and by the Right Reverend the Sissops Sent and Distributed throughout their several and respective Diocestes, to be observed and used in the Churches and Chappels of this Kingdom upon the several and respective Lays before mentioned: And lastly, his Pajesty doth Charge and Command all his loving Dubjetts to take notice hereof, and to be mean themselves in all things accordingly.

Given at Our Court at Writehall the 23d day of December, 1687. In the Third Year of Our Reign.
