


By the King and Queen, ROCLAMATION

For a Publick THANKSGIVING.

Brotent Dis Pafellies Berlon from the many and great Dangers of the War in Dis late Expebition beyond the Seas; To Disappoint and Defeat the Barbarous and horrid Conspiracy for taking away his Sacred Life by Assastiantion; And to bring him back in Safety to this Kingdom: Their Pajesties therefore Adoring the Divine Goodness and duly Considering that fuch Great and Publick Bleffings Do call for Publick and Solenn Acknowledgements, habe thought fit, and (with the Advice of Their Priby Council) do hereby Appoint and Command, That a Genetal Thankigibing to Almighty God for thele his Percies be oblerved throughout Dur Cities of London and Westminster and ellewhere within the Werkly Bills of Mortality, on Thursday the Ewenty febenth Day of this Infant October ; and in all other Places throughout this Kingdom of England, Dominion of Wales, and Lown of Berwick upon Tweed, on Thursday the Tenth Day of November next ensuing. And for the better and more orderly Solemnizing of the fame, Their Majeties have given Directions to the Bott Reverend Arch-Bilhops, and Right Reberend Bilhops of this Kingbom, to Compole a form of Blayer fuitable to this Occasion, to be Aled in all Churches and Chappels, and other Places of Bublick amorthip, and to take Care for the timely disperling of the fame throughout their respective Diocesses. And Their Pafefties do frinty Charge and Command, That the faid Dublick Day of Thanklgiving be Religioully Oblerved by all Their Loving Subjects, as they tender the Kabour of Almighty God, and up-on Pain of Suffering such Punishments as Their Pajesties can justly instit for the Contempt or peglect thereof.
