

By the Queen, A PROCLAMATION,

For a PUBLICK THANKSGIVING.

23. May. 1706.



E do most Deboutly and Thankfully Acknowledge the great Godnels and Derry of Almighty God, who has Continued to Us his Protection and Allikance in the Just War, in which We are now Engaged for the Common Safety of Dur Realms, and for Disappointing the Boundlels Ambition of France, and hath given to Dur Arms, in Conjunction with those of Dur Allies, under the Command of John Duke of Marlborough, Captain-General of Dur Land-Forces, a Signal and Glorious Aistory in Bradant ober the French Army, and hath Restored the greatest Part of the Spanish Netherlands to the Possestion of the Bouse of Austria, in the Person of King Charles the Third, by the Pappy and Monderful Progress of the Consederate Forces; And has also blest the Arms of Us and those of Dur Allies with great Successes in Catalonia, and other Parts of Spain; And therefore duly Considering

bleft the Arms of As and those of Dur Allies with great Successes in Catalonia, and other Parts of Spain; And therefore duly Considering that such Great and Publick Blessings do call for Publick and Solenn Acknowledgments, we have thought sit, by the Addice of Dur Prive-Council, to Issue out this Dur Koyal Proclamation, hereby Appointing and Commanding, That a General Thankssiding to Almighty God, for these his Percies, be Observed throughout Dur Kingdom of England, Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, upon Thursday the Twenty sedenth Day of June next. And so the better and more Religious and Orderly Solemnizing the same, we have given Directions to the Archbishop and Bishops of this Dur Kingdom, to Compose a Korm of Prayer suitable to this Octasion, to be Assert for the inness of the Charces and Chapeis, and other Places of Publick Another, and to take Care so, the timely Dispersing thereof through their respective Dioceses. And we krigally Charge and Compand, That the said Hubick Day of Thankssiving be Religioush Observed by all Our Loving Subjects, as they Tender the Favour of Almighty God, and upon Pagin of suffering such Punishments as the may justly Instituted as shall Contemn or Reglex the Personnance of so Religious and Accessary a Duty.

Given at Our Court at Kensington the Twenty first Day of May, 1706. In the Fifth Year of Our Reign.
