## A PROCLAMATION

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## THANKSGIVING. PUBLIC



S every Favor of Heaven, demands our fincere and cordial Gratitude; fo, do more steperal and national Salvations juffly challenge our most public and solemn Celebration of the Praise and Glory of Gops the gracious Giver of all Mercies.

I have therefore thought fit, by, and with the Advice of the Council, and at the Defire of the Representatives, in General Court affembled, to appoint, and do hereby appoint, Thursday, the Seventeenth Day of November next, to he observed as a Day of publick Thanksgiving throughout this Colony. Earnestly exhorting all his Majesty's Subjects, both Ministers and People, with becoming Devotion, religiously to observe the same, with publick Solemnity; rendering Praise to Almighty Gon, the Author of all our Bleffings, and of all our Salvations, through Riches of his Mercy in Issue Christ.

Especially, for the Continuance of the precious Life of our most gracious Sovereign King GEORGE the Third; and the happy Profpect of the Protestant Succession in his illustrious House; and for the Continuance of the Lives of all the Royal Family. For our Deliverance from the Burthens and Calamities of a bloody and expensive War, by the Settlement of a glorious Peace. For the Enjoyment of our most valuable, civil and religious Privileges. For the general Health throughout the Land. For the great and uncommon Plenty of the precious Fruits of the Earth. And for all other unmerited Inflances of divine Beneficence, more than may be reckoned up.

Also, to offer up servent Prayers to Goo, for the King's most excellent Majesty; Our gracious Queen Charlotte; Their Royal Highness, George Prince of Wales, the Princess Dowager of Wales, and all the Royal Family.

That GOD would be pleased to establish the Throne of the King in Rightcousness; make His Reign long and properous, and over-rule and order all the important Affairs of our Nation in Mercy; that the Peace may remain inviolate: The Rage and Cruelty of the Heathen be restrained, and they be disposed to Peace; and that the Gospel of Peace be fent and received among them, to general and faving Effect: That our large Experience of the Divine Goodness may lead us to unseigned Repentance and Reformation: That this Colony, in all its important Interests, may share in the Protections of Heaven: And, that the Means of Grace and Education be happily succeeded, both here, and throughout the World, till the Earth be filled with the Glory of the Lord.

And all fervile Labour is forbidden on faid Day.

Given under my Hand at the Council-Chamber, in New-Haven, this 27th Day of October, in the IVth Year of the Reign of Our Sovereign Lord George the IIId, by the Grace of GOD, of Great Britain, France and Ireland, King, &c. Annoque Domini, 1763.
