I do hereby recognize himself, and to declare him free to exercise and enjoy such functions in this colony and its villages as are allowed to the Consul of the French Republic in the law, treaties, and conventions, in that case made and provided.

In testimony whereof I have caused these letters to be made patent, and the seal of the United States to be affixed to this instrument.
