PROCLAMATION.

HEREAS the United States in Congress allembled did, on the cienteeth Day of October last past, issue a Proclamation in the Words following, to wit,

WHEREAS it hath pleafed the fupreme Miler of all human Events to dispose the Hearts of the late belligerent Powers to put a Period to the Effusion of human Blood, by proclaiming a Cellation of all Hostilities by Sea and Land; and these United States are not only happily reffined from the Dangers and Calamities to which trey have been to long exposed, but their Freedom, Sovereignty and Independence, ultimately acknowledged. And whereas in the Progress of 'a Contest on which the most essential Rights of homan Nature depended, the Interposition of Di-· vine Providence in our Favour hath been most abundantly and most graciously manifested, and the Citizen: of these United States have every Leason for Praise and Gratitude to the God of then Salvation. Impressed, therefore, with an exalted Scale of the Blessings by which we are fur-Scounded, and of our entire Dependence on that Almighty Being, from whose Goodness and Bounty they are derived, the United States in Congress affembled do recommend it to the several States to fet apart the fecond Thursday in December next, as a Day of publick Thanksgiv-Ling, that all the People may then affemble to edebrate with grateful Hearts and united Voices, *the Prailes of tileir supreme and all bountiful Benefactor for his numberless havours and Merches-that he hath been pleafed to conduct us in Safety through all the Perils and Viciffitudes of the War-that he bath given us Unanimity and Refolution to adhere to our just Rights-that he powerful Ally to affift us in supporting them, and hath fo far crowned our The Entered with Success, that in the Course of the present Year Hostilities have ceased, and same les in the undliputed Position of our Liberties and Independence, and of the Fruits of own Lands, and in the free Participation of the Treasures of the Sea inde me had and. stred the Labour of our Husbandmen with plentiful Harvests-and above all, that he hath been pleased to continue to us the Light of the blessed Gospel, and secured to us in the Stuffest Extent, the Rights of Conscience in Faith and Worship: And while our Hearts overflow with Gratitude and our Lips fet forth the Praifes of our great Creator, that we also offer up reavent Supplications, that it may pleafe him to pardon all our Offences, to give Wifdom and Unanimity to our publick Councils, to cement all our Citizens in the Bonds of Affection, and to intpire them with an earnest Regard for the national Honour and Interest, to enable them to improve the Days of Prosperity by every good Work, and to be Lovers of Peace and Tranequility; that he may be pleafed to blefs us in our Hufbandry, our Commerce and Navigation, to fmile upon our Seminaries and Means of Education, to cause Religion and Virtue to " flourith, to give Peace to all Nations, and to fill the World with his Glory."

I have therefore thought fit by and with the Advice of the Honourable the Privy-Council as well in Conformity to the faid Proclamation as from a deep Sense of our indispensable Obligations to testify in the most publick Manner our Gratitude to Almighty God for his unspeakable Goodness towards us) to appoint the said second Thursday of December next, to be set apart and observed as a Day of publick Thanksgiving in this State; and I do hereby earnestly recommend it to the Ministers of the Gospel of every Denomination therein to perform Divine Service, and to the People committed to their Charge to attend on publick Worship on that Day, and to absum from all service Labour, and all Recreations inconsistent with the Solemnity of the Festival.

Given under my Hand and Scal at Arms at Trenton, the eleventh Day of November, in the Year of our Lord One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty-three, and of the Sovereignty and Independence of the United States of America the eighth.
