Order for THANKSGIUING to Almighty God, for having put an End to the Spanish Invasion,

A PROCLAMATION.

LMIGHTY GOD hath in all Ages shown His Power and Mercy in the Miraculous and Gracious Deliverance o His Church, and in the Protection of Righteous and Religious KINGS, and States profesting His holy and eternal Truth, from the open Invalions, wicked Conspiracies and maliciou Practices, of all the Enemies thereof. He hat by the Manifeltation of rus rioridence delivered us from the hands of the Spaniards, the with fourteen Sail of small Gallies and other Craft came into Cumberland Sound; but Fear and Terror from the Lord, came upon them and they fice i. The Spaniards also, with another mighty Fleet of 36 Ships and Veffels came into Jekyll Sound, and after a sharp Fight became Mafters thereof; we having only four Veffels to oppose their whole Force, and Gop was the Since in fo unequal a Shield of our People. which was floutly maintained for the frace of four Hours, not one of ours was killed, though many of theirs Perished, and five were killed by one Shot only. They Landed 4500 Men upon this Island, according to the Accounts of the Prisoners, and even of Englishmen who escaped from them. The first Party Marched up thros the Wc is to this Town, and was within fight thereof, when Goo delivered them into the Hands of a few of ours. They Fought and were disperied and fleed. Another Party which supported them also Fought, but were soon dispersed. We may with Truth say, that the Hand of the Lord Fought for us; for in the two Fights more than 500 fleed before 50, and ye. they for a time Fought with Courage, and the Granadiers particularly, charged with great Refelution, but their Shot did not take Place, in b much that none of ours were killed; but the were broken and purfued with great Slaughter, b that by the Reports of the Prisoners, since taker. upwards of 200 Men never returned to ther Camp. They also cane up with their half Galies towards this Town, and retired without fo much as Firing one Shot, and then Fear came upon them and they fleed, leaving behind them four Cannon, and many Things they had takes. Twenty Eight Sail attacked Fort William, in which was only 50 Men, and after three Hours Fight, went away, and left the Province: They having been pursued as far as St. John's so that

by this whole Expedition and great Armaments, no more than two of ours were taken and 2 killed. Therefore with Truth we may fay, that the Lord hath done great Things for us, who hath delivered us out of the Hands of a Numerous Enemy who had already Swallowed us up in their Thoughts' and boasted that they would Torture and Burn us. But the Lord was our Shield, and we of a Truth may say, that it was not our Strength nor Might that delivered us, but that it was the Lord: Therefore it is Meat and Fitting, that we should return Thanks unto God our Deliverer.

HAVING taken the Premisses into Consideration, I do hereby Order that Sunday the 25th. Instant be observed as a Day of publick Thanksgiving to Almighty God for his great deliverance in having put an End to the Spanish Invasion, and that all Persons do Solemnize the same in a Christian and Religious Manner, and abstain from Drunkenness and any other wicked

or dissolate Test sonies of Joy.

The Person that Piloted in the Spanish Fleet into St. Simons-Sound, so as to avoid the Batterys and prevented the New-York Vessels from escaping was one Mr. Anthony Saris, alias Alexander whose Father was Treaturer to the Publick in South Carolina, and whose Family are in that Province.

There being inserted in the Casolina Gazette from July the \$2th 1741, in that Part thereof which is there called the Honourable John Fenwick,
Esq; his Speech to Col. Vander Dussen, many extraordinary things, and one particularly which we cannot help
taking Notice of, viz.

When Commodore Pearle had also set Sail, and left you (viz. Vander Dussen) alone upon that Island (viz. Anastasia) with the Forces only of this Province, for your having brought off notwithstanding (under the Biessing of Ged) with such good Condust, all the Artillery which the General had declared impossible to be done, and preserved the same, together with all your Men, Craft &C. at that deplorable functure, when in all human, Probability, the whole must have fallen into the Enemies Hands, and happily compleated your Retreat without any Loss.

N'e think ourselves obliged in Justice, not only to Capt. Pearse and the Officers and Seamen of that Squadron, but to his Majesty's Service, and to the World, which may be descrived by the above Affertion to declare, That the same is not Falt, and that Mr. I nder Dussen and the Carolina Regiment were not less upon Anastralia alone That they did not alone bring off the Arti-

Artillery,

lery, and that they did not compleat the Retreat, but on the contrary, that General Orderhorpe with a Part of his Resiment, in which was May r Heron, Capts, Defining and Dunber, Lieutenant James Mackay, Enfine Tilfin, Mackey Sutherland, Catheart Stewart and Henrifs, and Quarter-Majier Wanfell, formed the Reaction the Researt upon the Main, for that he with this part of his Resiment, the Indians, Rangers and Hyllanders five the Arathery, excepting one Piece of Cannon which was left behind but ft, and all the Munich Stores were embarked from Anaflesia, and till no favoral the Craft with them on Board, failed out of the Harberr, and the Min of the Harberr, and the Min of War-alfo failed.

And we do also declare that the only Battery which elidengings the half Gallies the Doy of the Retreat, was managed by Air. Mace, and Ason paid by General Oglethorpe, and guarded by a Decachance of his Regiment, and that, under the Command of Enfgus Associated Hugan, and that the said Battery did societies of Le

Gallies aground.

There was noon Anaftasia besides Me. Vander Dussea's Regiment, some of the Generals Regiment which stayed to the very last with the Artillery, and a large Party of Sailers also were left by Capt. Parts, and the Captains of the Men of Har of the list to the list, and belo to bring off the Cannon, and were poid by General Ogle boy's order for every Gan they brought off. And Mir. Vander Dussen vas softer from compleating any Retreat, that a Party of General Oglebas? Regiment commanded by Mr. Hogan, marched in the Rear of the Caroline Regiment, and after that Regiment had wearch'd off, the General in the Rear of his own Regiment secured the Retreat.

Whereas the Names of Lieutenants, Maxwell and Cadigan are fight to the faregoing Paragraph in which they do appear to have been Present in the Retreet, they think it necessary to add the following

Explanation.

At the first Resising of the Carolina Regiment, the General to assist that Province in descripting their Men, dispensed with the Duty of us, who were second Ensigns in his Regiment, and we were accordingly appointed Officers in this Service, viz. Mr. Maxwell, Capt. Lie menant, and Mr. Cadogan, Lieuenant. That upon the first Promotion we were both appointed Captains. As this obviates an Objection which might be made by some who dare to Print what they cannot Sign, it also encloses us to add the solowing Particulars, which is all not occur to other Persons.

After the Orders were given for for a Retreat, Capt Dunbar by the General's Order come from his Camp on the Main to Anaflefia in the General's Cutter, and assisted in embarking the Carolina Regiment, and after the whole were gone off, Capt. Dunbar geturned to Point Quartelle, and flaged there till Col. Vander Daffen, and the greatest Part of his Regiment was landed. and then seem and reported to the General that Col. Vander Duffen, was Landed fife at Point Quartelle, which is seperated from Augustine by an Arm if the Sea, which tegether with a Party of the General's Regiment u hich marchea in our Rear, was a great happinoss to us; for the Carolina Regiment marched in Joch Diforder that the Van, which the Col. generally led. was fe dom less than four Miles from the Rear And at the first Night's builting, Cel. Vander Diffen, lay in the Front and Mir. Maxwell in the Gear, at the diftruce of two Miles, and that the Regiment never join d till they came to St. John's, where the Col. arrived feveral Hours before the whole came up.

That a Day are some offer. An Ordeline Regiment time to St. John's Mr. M. Newell Rode back to come the revelve Miles towards St. Augustine, where he mes the General and his Regimens in their march to St. John's.
