## A PROCLAMATION, For a Publick Thanksgiving.

A WILL

HEREAS it has been the laudable and uninterrupted Practice of the People of this Government, from the first Settlement of the Colony of Massachusetts-Bay, annually, to make their publick thankful and religious Acknowledgments of the Divine Favours received in the Course of the Year, there having been no Period even in the midst of the greatest Judgments in which there has not been large Experience of the Divine Compassion and Forbearance; And whereas, notwithstanding

that in the Course of the Year that is past, GOD has been testifying his Displeasure against us, by the Frowns of his Providence upon our Publick Affairs, (the just Demerit of our heinous and provoking Transgressions,) He has still been pleased to confer upon us, and to suffer to be continued to us, many great and invaluable Blessings of which we are altogether undeserving, and which call for our publick and devout Thanksgivings; And, His Majesty's Council and the House of Representatives having desired me to appoint and set apart a Day for this Purpose;

Dave therefore tho't fit to appoint Thursday the Twenty-sith of the present Month of November to be observed thro'out the province as a Day of Publick Thanksgiving, hereby requiring the several Assemblies for religious Alouship to celevrate the same: And I do erhort Incider and people to offer up their devout Praises and Adorations to Almighty GOD for his unsmerted knowns bouchsafed to us the past Pear; particularly, in that he hath been pleased to continue and maintain in the Association has body Religion, as professed by the Resonance Churches, against the resteles Attempts of its indeterate Encintes; to preserve the important Life of our Sovereign Lord the KING, and the several Branches of His Royal Family, and in so signal a Danser to unite the bearts of his Divolets in Loyalty, Duty and Assembly, and in so signal a Danser to unite the Enjoyment of their Civil and Redgious Privileges; to desend our Frontiers in so great a Declure in a Time of general Danger from the Radages of a barbarous Enemy; so protect our Nadigation and Fishery; to continue dealth in so many of our Lowins, and trepredent epidemical and mostal dickness from spreading among us; to give dis Blessing of the Fruits of the Earth, and to grant us Plenty of such of them as are most necessary for the Support and Comfort of Life: And, together with publick Mercies, I recommend to Persons of all Conditions, a grateful Commemoration of private and personal Favours.

AND, with our Praises, it becomes us to some our humble Supplications to the Divine Waielty, and with truly penitent frames of Soul, to imploze, through the Derits of JESUS CHRIST, the pardon of all our past Ingratitude, and the Influences of the Biessed Spirit, to enable us suitably to resent and improve all the Dispensations of Providence, whether merciful or assistive, and to acknowledge and adore the righteous Sovereignty of an infinitely wise and and may Rulers and People so approve themselves to him as that he may be graciously pleased to abert the Judgments that are impending over us, to continue the Fabours that we enjoy, and to bestow upon us all such further Derices as we stand in need of.

AND all service Labour is forbidden on the faid Day.
