## A PROCLAMATION,

FOR A CENERAL THANKSGIVING.

THE most gracious and merciful Condescension of our heavenly FATHER, in bestowing the various Blessings of Life on us sinful Mortals, who are of our-felves unworthy to receive the least Favour from his benevolent Hand, should make us sensible that it is our indispensible Duty to offer up our united Praises and Thanksgivings for all his Mercies vouchsafed to us, particularly those of the Year past, which were wholly unmerited by us:

Have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of his Majesty's Council, to order and appoint that Thursday the twenty first Day of November next, be obferved and kept as a Day of publick Thankfgiving throughout this Province, hereby commending to, and enjoining both Ministers and People, in their several religious Assemblies to devote a reasonable Part of said Day to publick Worship; and with thankful and obedient Hearts, to bless and praise the great Name of the LORD, that he hath been mercifully pleased to preserve to us the inestimable Life of our Sovereign Lord King GEORGI, the Lives of our gracious Queen CHAR-LOTTE, their Royal Highnesses GEORGE, Prince of Wales, the Princess DOW-AGER of Wales, and all the Royal Family. That it hath pleafed GOD to increase their illustrious House by the Birth of a Prince. That our civil and facred Liberties are continued in Safety. For the Continuance of Peace: that we have not been afflicted with contagious Sickness, but hath graciously granted the Voice of Joy and Health to be heard in our Habitations; Wherefore let us with fervent Humility and Thankfulness glorify GOD; most humbly beseeching of his Divine Mercy, that we may obediently walk in his holy Commandments, and leading quiet and peaceable Lives, in all Godline's and Honesty, we may continually offer unto GOD, an acceptable Sacrifice of Praise and Thanksgiving, for all his Mercies confer'd upon us.

And all fervile LABOUR is forbidden on faid Day.
